In 2023, we moved into our newly constructed Hunger Awareness Center. This accomplishment will help us realize our Vision to "Unite the public and private sectors and to raise awareness about the impact of poverty". This new facility expands our capacity to welcome in members of our community to work alongside us and engage in conversations about food and nutrition insecurity and the efforts to address it. We dedicated our new Hunger Awareness Center to our founding Executive Director, Tina Osso.



This is an excerpt from our dedication ceremony in September:

"The voices of those who came before us cry out. Their wisdom still lingers in the air as we strive to grasp hold of their truths. As we celebrate our 40th anniversary, we reflect on the vision of one woman, Tina Osso, whose tenacity, and perseverance culminated into this very moment. She forged a robust network of charitable food providers, informed national and state policy to fight food insecurity, and laid a foundation upon which we now stand. Tina is a testament to the principle that the work we do today takes root and blossoms into the hope of tomorrow."

While we celebrate our growth and development, this is a sobering accomplishment. It is a reminder that the need for food assistance is prevalent and unrelenting. In fact, the more than ten million pounds of food that we distributed in 2023, is comparable only to the amount that we distributed in 2020 during the pandemic, our highest ever.

We have discovered that economic recovery for low-income families is much slower and more complex. Increased food, fuel, and vehicle costs, affordable housing shortages, inflated rent rates, expensive childcare, and the withdrawal of federal benefits (to name a few) exacerbate existing barriers to overcoming poverty, deepening the hole to climb out of.

We recognize that it is not enough to simply distribute food. While it is absolutely imperative that we meet people where they are, in times of crisis, that we are also intentional about, "shortening the line"; or reducing the need for people to have to turn to a food pantry in the first place. We can only do this by engaging the people who are impacted by food insecurity and uniting the community to be part of the solution.

Hunger Awareness Center Opens!

More than 44 million Americans (1 in 7) face food insecurity in the United States every single day, including 13 million children. This is the highest rate since 2014 and the largest one-year increase since 2008. Increases affect every subgroup and population in the country. Feeding America reports that inflationary pressures on family budgets, including food and fuel prices, are impacting the numbers of neighbors seeking assistance. As many as 40% of neighbors visiting our pantries are new to charitable food assistance.

In response to these challenges, Shared Harvest made an investment into our mission and opened a brand-new facility, aptly named the Hunger Awareness Center. While the building houses most of our offices now, its primary purpose is to house the community and allow others to join us in our fight against hunger.

We are now able to host multiple volunteer groups and activities each day, in a space that has been designed to allow us to welcome the public to learn about the experiences of those that are just barely making ends meet.

With an outpouring of support from our families and community, we held a Ribbon Cutting ceremony on Saturday, September 9th.
Guests were invited to listen to Billy Two Shoes as they toured the facility, enjoyed snacks, and learned about what we do here at the foodbank.

9/11 Day of Service

On Monday, September 11, 2023, twenty-two years after the tragic events of 9/11/2001, Shared Harvest partnered with the 9/11 Day Foundation, AmeriCorps, Kids Around the World, and Freestore Foodbank to offer a unique volunteer opportunity to hundreds of people at the Cintas Center, located on the campus of Xavier University.



Shared Harvest staff arrived bright and early that Monday morning to meet and talk with the press covering the event as the arena was transformed to accommodate several food packing lines. Each table was equipped with all the materials needed to create nutritious meals of rice, lentils, and vitamins, each individually sealed and labeled at each station.

Attendees came from all five counties that we serve to see our new space and to receive some refresher training!


FOODINSECURITY

Food insecurity is defined by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) as the lack of access, at times, to enough food for an active, healthy life.



1 in 6 Americans turned to the charitable food network in 2022.

100% of counties in the United States have food insecure households.





13 million children living in the United States are food insecure; 40.3% of households receiving SNAP benefits have children

In the United States, \$2,020,497,444 is distributed through SNAP, generating \$3,434,845,655 in economic activity*.



*Economists estimate that every dollar a household redeems through SNAP generates about \$1.70 in economic activity.

Direct Service Programs

Senior Food Program

The Commodity Supplemental Food
Program (CSFP) distributed 22,386
nutritional boxes of food to our Senior
Citizens in 2023. We are serving 240
more Seniors than last year!



Childhood Hunger Relief Program

Along with our generous sponsors and in partnership with local schools, Shared Harvest distributed 70,860 weekend bags of food to children. We also supported the opening of school-based pantries to serve entire families facing food insecurity.

SNAP Outreach

Our Help Center assisted 1097 families apply for SNAP benefits, providing 402,203 meals.

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program can provide nine meals for every one we provide. Thanks to new digital initiatives, like GSNAP, we can help more neighbors apply.



Distributions & Foodbanking

In 2023, Shared Harvest hosted
158 Drive-Thru Distributions,
distributing 1.3 million pounds of
food throughout Butler, Darke,
Miami, Preble, and Warren
counties.

Resulting in 8.5 million meals provided to 469,001 neighbors, comprised of 82,706 seniors and 150,019 children!

We rescued more than 7.3 million pounds of food in 2023. As a result, we were able to keep those pounds out of a landfill and provide more than 6.1 million meals.

In 2023, Shared Harvest had 2,608 unduplicated volunteers who contributed 7,837 hours of service to help us fight food insecurity.




